Project brief No Clothes Without Fabric

Fabric search and questionnaire

Aim:

To start to become more aware of basic terms, uses, components and structure of fabric – the infinitely diverse material of which clothes are made - so that from Day 1 of the course you are better equipped to design and construct clothing.

This research project is designed to equip you with some basic fabric knowledge so that you'll know what's being referred to by names of fabrics and terms that come up

on the course. Some of you will already be familiar with a wide range of fabrics through your own research or your previous course, while some of you will have almost no knowledge or awareness of fabrics at this stage. This is to prepare you all for a level playing-field when we kick-off in September in Year 1.

If you can answer/produce samples easily, do so. If you need to do a bit of research or travelling in response to these questions, do so. Put all your findings and answers in a sketchbook. Anything you find that is extra, that excites, surprises or interests you, stick in the back, and bring your book with you in September. This book will be your Fabric Research Book in which you can log fabric information, discoveries and swatches as the course progresses, for easy access and organisation!

- 1 What is calico? What is it used for in the fashion industry?
- 2 Name and find samples of 8 different cotton fabrics such as denim, shirting and so on.
- 3 Name and find samples of 8 different silk fabrics.
- 4 What is meant by 'woven'? Find 2 examples in which the weft and the warp (what are these?) are composed of different fibres.
- 5 What is meant by 'jersey'? Find examples of cotton, wool, silk and synthetic jersey.
- 6 What is meant by 'pile' and 'direction'? Find 4 examples.
- 7 What is meant by 'Intelligent Fabric'?
- 8 What is meant by 'Performance Fabric'?
- 9 What is 'Upcycling'?
- 10 Name a raw material used to produce sustainable fabric.
- 11 What is a 'toile'?
- 12 Name and find samples of 6 different wool fabrics.
- 13 What is 'felt'?
- 14 What is a 'jacquard'?
- 15 What is meant by the term 'bias' in relation to fabric?
- 16 Find examples of sheer, transparent, translucent and opaque fabrics.
- 17 What are 'fibres'?
- 18 What is 'yarn'?

This project must be completed by the first day of term.

Materials and equipment

You will set up a credit account with the department in your first week of £200, £70 of which will cover your essential sewing kit, which includes snips, presser feet, bobbins and workshop materials. The remaining £130 will fund any materials you wish to buy from the Fashion Department stores, such as calico, pattern paper and further fabrics.

You are also required to purchase the following items from this list of **essential** equipment, all of which is available from <u>www.eastman.co.uk</u> or <u>www.morplan.com</u> or other online suppliers.

It is vitally important that you have all of the equipment listed below by the beginning of term. You will be using it in workshops from the start of term.

- Pattern Master or Shoben FashionCurve
- 1 metre Ruler

- Pattern Notcher (Standard Quality)
- Pattern Drill 4mm hole
- Wooden Awl
- Tracing Wheel
- Quick Unpic
- Tape Measure
- 1 x 30mm Dressmakers Pins-100g
- 2 Pack Tailors Chalk
- Scissors (for paper)
- Good quality pair of shears (for fabric). It is important that you choose your own individual cutting shears as there is a wide selection and you need to find out what size and weight suits you. Ask to try them out in the shop. If you are left-handed you can get left-handed shears. Cutting shears must only be used for fabric and NEVER paper or card

Pattern cutting equipment

- A set of thin tipped, coloured felt-tip pens
- Highlighter pens
- A mechanical pencil with lead no softer than 'H'
- An eraser
- Masking tape
- A pin cushion which fastens to your wrist
- 1 x small pack of dressmakers pins (30mm length)
