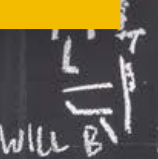

Living Support

The Living Support team provide a personal, focussed service offering in-depth assessment, advising, referring and liaising on a wide range of student life issues so you receive the support you need, as well as understanding your options. The team responds to concerns about welfare and behaviour across the student community.

Wellbeing Services

Wellbeing Services provide self-help resources, counselling and advice for students who experience anxiety, stress and other mental health issues. They offer short-term solution-focused counselling. Your counsellor will respect your confidentiality, and won't give advice or judge you, but will work alongside you to find your way forward.

Wellbeing Practitioners help students to explore issues and concerns in a safe environment, and can support referral to external services such as the NHS.

Accessibility & Inclusive Learning

Accessibility & Inclusive Learning provides advice, support and assistance for students with disabilities and long-term health conditions, and with specific learning difficulties (SpLDs) including dyslexia and dyspraxia.

Dyslexia Skills Tutors help develop students' study skills and make the most of their learning strengths.

Chaplaincy

The Multifaith Chaplaincy provides pastoral and spiritual care and conversation, for students and staff of all faiths and none. Chaplains assist with meeting religious needs and can offer links to faith communities in Cornwall. The Chaplaincy also provides spaces on campus for prayer, meditation and quiet.

Student Mentors

Sometimes it's really helpful to have someone around who already knows the ropes. That's where our Student Mentors come in. Every Fresher is paired with a Mentor – someone who can be a listening ear, a helping hand, and a font of knowledge.

Who are the Student Mentors?

Student Mentors are trained second or third year students from every course.

Every new undergraduate student has a Student Mentor

They'll be your friendly face and point of contact for any questions you may have during your first year at Falmouth.

Student Mentors are volunteers and give their time to help students settle in.

What do they do?

They'll help you settle into Falmouth and your course, and get the most out of being at Falmouth for the whole of your first year.

They can help you connect with other students on your course, while offering help and guidance.

How will they get in touch?

Essential Paperwork



Registration

Registering at Falmouth University means officially enrolling on your course, confirming your personal details, and agreeing to abide by the University regulations and policies.

In order to be officially registered as a student at Falmouth University, you must complete the online registration and enrolment process. If you are an undergraduate student, enrolling online at least three working days before the start of term will release your student loan.

Student loans are released on the first day of term and you will have received confirmation from Student Finance that your application has been processed. You must have signed and returned your declaration form to your Student Finance body.

Once you have completed the online enrolment process, you'll be able to complete the IT registration process if you haven't already.

How do I register?

For UK/EU students, registration and enrolment takes place online. To do it, you'll need the university username and password that were sent to the contact email address you gave us. If you haven't received either of these emails, let us know at student.admin@falmouth.ac.uk.

To enrol, log in to my.falmouth.ac.uk and go to the Online Enrolment option in the top left of the screen. You'll then be guided through a series of tasks. When you've done this, we'll send a confirmation email to your registered email address.

When should I do it?

You can enrol now, and it's best to do it as soon as possible. Completing the process releases your student loan and confirms your access to buildings and IT services. All students should be registered within two weeks of starting their studies – failing to do so could lead to your access and course registration being terminated.



International Registration

Registration is an important condition of your stay in this country and should be completed as soon as you arrive if you hold a Tier 4 visa.

How do I register?

If you hold a Tier 4 Visa, we ask that you visit the Falmouth University Student Administration Desk during Welcome Weekend. Please remember to bring your valid passport with you, as we are required by UK Visas & Immigration (UKVI) to verify and register your immigration details. We'll issue your biometric residence permit (BRP) at the same time, if you have chosen to have it sent directly to Falmouth University. If you have chosen to collect your BRP yourself from a Post Office, please bring it to the Registration Desk to have it copied and verified.

This is one of our duties as your Tier 4 sponsor, and it is also a condition of your stay as a student in the UK.

When should I do it?

You must present your documents within two weeks of your studies starting. If you don't do this, your registration will be terminated, UKVI will be informed, and your permission to study in the UK could be affected.

At the start of each study block you will be asked to present your current passport and visa documents for re-registration. You should always do this promptly: if you fail to respond to these requests, it is likely that your student registration will be cancelled and UKVI will be informed.

Proof of registration

At the start of the year, you may be asked to provide external organisations with proof of your registration in the form of a letter or certificate. You can request or print these via your My Falmouth account.

Council Tax certificate

All full-time students are entitled to exemption from paying Council Tax. Once the registration period has ended we will notify Cornwall Council of all students and their term-time addresses.

It is your responsibility to make sure that you are registered at the correct address with the Council Taxation Office: If you need to amend your address we suggest you contact them at revenues@cornwall.gov.uk. If needed, Council Tax Exemption Certificates can be printed directly from myfalmouth.falmouth.ac.uk.

If you are a part-time student you may also need a letter from your course team confirming your hours of attendance.

Bank letter

To open a student bank account you'll need to provide the bank with a letter confirming your registration at Falmouth University. You can request the letter on your My Falmouth account and collect it from Student Administration.

Proof of enrolment

Throughout your time at Falmouth University you may be asked to provide proof of other information relating to your studies; you can request this through the My Falmouth service online and collect them from Student Administration.

If you need a formal letter that is not accessible via your My Falmouth account, just email student.admin@falmouth.ac.uk.

Registering with a doctor

All students are advised to register with a local GP practice. Information about healthcare services is available from Student Services. Penryn Surgery offers daily appointments at the Penryn Campus during term time; just collect a registration form from The Compass.

Meningitis and measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccinations

You are strongly advised to contact your GP regarding your immunisation status, particularly MMR and meningitis, as young people can be particularly vulnerable. So, do check your immunisations are up to date.

The Library

We can guide you around the library and help you uncover the wealth of resources available.

Regular Library tours will be available at both campus libraries during the first two weeks of term.

During Welcome Week, they will run on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. In the second week tours will be available every day from Monday to Friday.

All tours will start at the Library helpdesks and will run every 30 minutes between 11am and 1.30pm with an evening tour at the Penryn Campus Library at 6pm. Tours will take approximately 15 minutes.

Moving into your accommodation

On campus accommodation

You can collect your accommodation keys and information pack from Glasney Lodge. From 14 September The Welcome Team will help you to your accommodation and direct you to some of the campus facilities.

Glasney Lodge is open 24 hours a day to assist with all enquiries and problems.

Off-campus accommodation

Minibuses will be running from Glasney Lodge to take you to your accommodation, whether it is a university-managed site or a private house.

When you arrive, you will be given a food voucher to use in one of the campus cafes.

Collecting your Tier 4 BRP (biometric residence permit)

If you have been granted a Tier 4 Student Visa, you will be issued with

a 30-day vignette sticker in your passport to allow you to travel to the UK, but you will need to collect your biometric residence permit (BRP) within 10 days of entering the UK. Your decision letter will confirm where you should collect your BRP from, and when it will be available.

If you have completed the entire visa application process (including submission of your biometric information) and have nominated Falmouth University as your Alternative Collection Location (ACL), you can collect your BRP from the Falmouth University Student Administration desk at the Penryn Campus during Welcome Weekend. You must take your passport with you for identification.

Your passport will be scanned and documented by the Student Administration team to release your BRP card.

If you have not nominated Falmouth University as your ACL, or have not submitted your biometric information as part of the visa application process, you will need to travel to Truro Post Office to collect your BRP. The Compass desk in The Exchange Building will be able to advise you on how to get there. You must collect your BRP within 10 days of your arrival in the UK.

Please check the UK Visas and Immigration website for more information about obtaining your BRP: gov.uk/biometric-residence-permits/collect.

How to open a bank account in the UK

Enrol with Falmouth University to get a letter from the Student Administration department. You'll need to choose which bank you want to register with first, as each has a different letter format.

Make an appointment with the bank you'd like to join and take the letter and your passport with you (plus anything else the bank asks for).

Student Administration

Submitting your work

There are three main submission routes for work:

1. Physical submission to the Student Administration Offices at Penryn or Falmouth Campus.
2. Studio submission as advised by your course team.
3. Online Submission.

Your personalised hand-in dates, including timed deadlines for your modules, will be available on the My Falmouth portal. There you'll also find details about the type of submission and where to submit.

Remember:

It is your responsibility to check deadlines and make sure that you submit on time.

Online submissions can take some time to upload and IT/printing facilities can be very busy during hand-in times, so do factor this in to your planning.

Work submitted after the published cut-off point will be considered late and subject to a cap of 40%. Work can only be submitted late during the 7-day 'grace period'. This 'grace period' does not apply to adjusted

deadlines or referral or deferral assessments due to be submitted for institutional deadlines.

You can submit work up to one week in advance of the published deadline.

If you have an adjusted deadline or an approved Extenuating Circumstances claim, your new individual deadline will be communicated via your hand in dates on the My Falmouth portal.

Extenuating circumstances

Life in Falmouth

At Falmouth, you'll find a creative community stretching far beyond the campus. Here, you're lucky enough to live within one of the most dynamic and inspirational locations in Cornwall.

Independent minds

Through centuries, Falmouth has attracted visionaries like JMW Turner, Henry Scott Tuke and Ben Nicholson. So it's no surprise that the local area has an active creative scene, spanning the visual arts, performance, film and literature.

In Penryn, you can visit the on-campus Academy of Music and Theatre Arts (AMATA) and the pop-up Penryn Picture House, while Falmouth has both Falmouth Art Gallery and The Poly: a creative institution offering film, performance, workshops and exhibitions.

Unforgettable events

Packed with festivals, events and exhibitions, the Cornish year is always lively. Popular events include the Cornwall Film Festival in Redruth (November), Cornwall Contemporary Poetry Festival in Falmouth (November), Fowey Festival of Arts and Literature (May) and Port Eliot Festival (July).

Falmouth's Events Square hosts large-scale music and food celebrations, including the

Falmouth Oyster Festival in October, Falmouth Week in August and the Folk 'n' Cider Fayre in March. The Princess Pavilion in Falmouth stages theatre productions, live music and comedy, welcoming acts like The Staves, Electric Swing Circus, Ben Howard and the Brian Jonestown Massacre.

Fresh perspectives

For many, the greatest inspiration comes from our ever-changing natural environment. Sitting right by the sea, Falmouth and Penryn boast beautiful beaches, historic harbours and scenic coastal paths. You'll also find sheltered valleys, nature reserves and lots of exotic sub-tropical gardens (in fact, our Falmouth campus is in the middle of one).





Getting Around

Our excellent green transport provision makes this the easiest and cheapest way to get around. We work with local transport providers to bring you special student fares and offers on local routes.

We recommend that you avoid bringing your car to campus. With the exception of blue badge permit holders, there is no student parking on the Falmouth Campus, and a limited amount on the Penryn Campus.

Public transport

Dedicated University buses: £1 fare on U1, U2 and U3 buses between the Falmouth and Penryn campuses with your student ID, plus services every 10 minutes between campuses.

Excellent rail links: trains run every 30 minutes to Falmouth, Penryn and Truro. Season tickets, Bus Plus (rail and bus combi tickets) and off-peak student railcards are available for savings on your fares.

Travel card

Fal Mussel Card Uni gives you unlimited travel between the Falmouth and Penryn campuses, as well as on all First buses in Cornwall and around the Fal River and Cornwall on an integrated network of ferries, buses and trains.

Cycling



Living in the Community

If you're living in privately rented accommodation this year, you're very lucky to be living in such a vibrant, friendly community. However, it comes with new responsibilities and new neighbours that you should be considerate of.



Moving in

There are some simple steps you should take when you first move into your privately rented accommodation:

1. Say hello!

Meet your new neighbours. Being on good terms with the people living next door can be really helpful – you can find out a bit about them and how they live their lives, and it will be easier for you to appreciate any concerns they may have. In turn, they might be more tolerant of any disturbance and can keep an eye on your property while you're away.

2. Do the accommodation admin

- Check the inventory that the landlord should have provided
- Take date stamped photos of each room, so you have a record of the condition of the property
- Read the utility meters
- Take a look at the gas certificate

3. Get familiar with the bin collections

A regular source of friction among students and the community is rubbish. Seagulls can be a particular nuisance!

- Use a bird/animal proof container such as a dustbin with secure lid or obtain a free seagull proof sack from the Town's One Stop Shop in Church Street.
- Use the proper bags/boxes for your recycling, which can be obtained free of charge at cornwall.gov.uk/recycling.
- Put your rubbish out for collection no earlier than dusk on the day before collection and remove your bins and boxes from the street one they've been emptied. Collections are on Tuesdays in Falmouth and Penryn.
- Don't put garden waste, bulky items, electrical equipment, chemicals or batteries or clinical waste such as needles or medicines out with your household waste.

4. Be aware of noise

- Give your neighbours plenty of notice if you are planning a house party and give them your contact details, in case there is a problem (if your neighbour has your number, they are more likely to call you than the police). Never advertise your party on Facebook.
- Tell your friends to be quiet when they leave your house in the evenings
- Minimise vibrations by moving TVs and speakers away from the walls and lowering the bass
- Close your windows and doors to stop sound travelling

5. Park considerately

You should not bring a car to university unless it is essential.

If you must have a car at Falmouth, you are responsible for complying with local parking legislation including obtaining a Resident Parking Permit, if necessary.

Moving out

It might seem a long way away, but the year will fly by and it may soon be time to pack up again. Here are some tips on what to do when you move out.

1. Change your address

Do it 2-3 weeks before you move so you don't miss out on any essential post.

2. Cancel the utilities

Let your utility providers know you're leaving, or they'll keep charging you. Try to call them as soon as you know your moving out date and take meter readings on the day you leave.

3. Check the photos

Take a look at the pictures you took when you moved in to ensure everything's still in order. This includes going through the house inventory.

4. Have some good clean fun

Book a day with all your housemates to clean up before you move.

5. Speak to the landlord

Set up an inspection date to inspect the house together while you and your housemates are all still around.

6. If there are any problems...

Staying Safe



Falmouth and Penryn are vibrant, diverse and safe places to live, study and work. But here are some things you can do to make sure you stay safe and well and places you can turn to if you need help and support.

Home security:

- Lock your doors and windows when you go out
- Keep valuables out of sight, security mark them and think about registering them so they can be identified if they're stolen and recovered by the police
- If you have a bike, get a good bike lock and make sure you always lock it to something secure

Personal safety:

- **Watch how much you drink**
Sometimes you can do risky things when you're drunk and you're more likely to lose your belongings. Make sure you eat before you drink, drink plenty of water and keep track of what and how much you're drinking. Never leave your drink unattended or accept a drink from a stranger.
- **Look out for your friends**
Keep an eye on the people you're with, speak up if you think they might be drinking too much and don't let them wander off on their own.

● **Getting home**

Make sure your mobile is charged and able to make calls when you go out, try to leave a pub or club with friends, keep hold of some money for a taxi and pre-book a licensed taxi or know the locations of official taxi ranks. If you have to walk home alone, try to stick to well-lit areas.

Risk of suicide:

If you don't feel you can keep yourself safe or are worried about someone else, seek immediate help:

- Go, or take the other person, to any hospital A&E department
- Call 999 and ask for an ambulance if you can't get to A&E

If you need some support right now, but don't want to go to A&E, here are some other options:

- Contact the Samaritans for free on 116 123, they're open 24 hours and are there to listen
- Contact your GP for an emergency appointment
- Call NHS 111
- Contact Student Services (who will be able to provide advice Monday to Friday 9pm-5pm).

A reminder about sexual consent:

It is an offence for a person to intentionally touch another person sexually without reasonable belief that they consented. Touching covers all physical contact, whether with a part of the body or anything else, or through clothing.

Consenting to one form of sexual activity does not mean implied consent to any other e.g., kissing doesn't mean you've agreed to anything else and consenting on one occasion does not imply consent at another. Consent can be withdrawn at any point and at any time and consent cannot be given if a person is drunk or high on drugs.

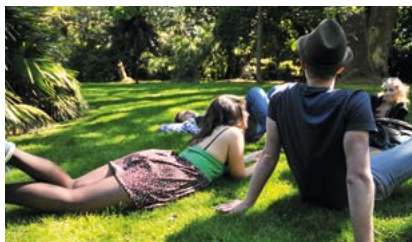

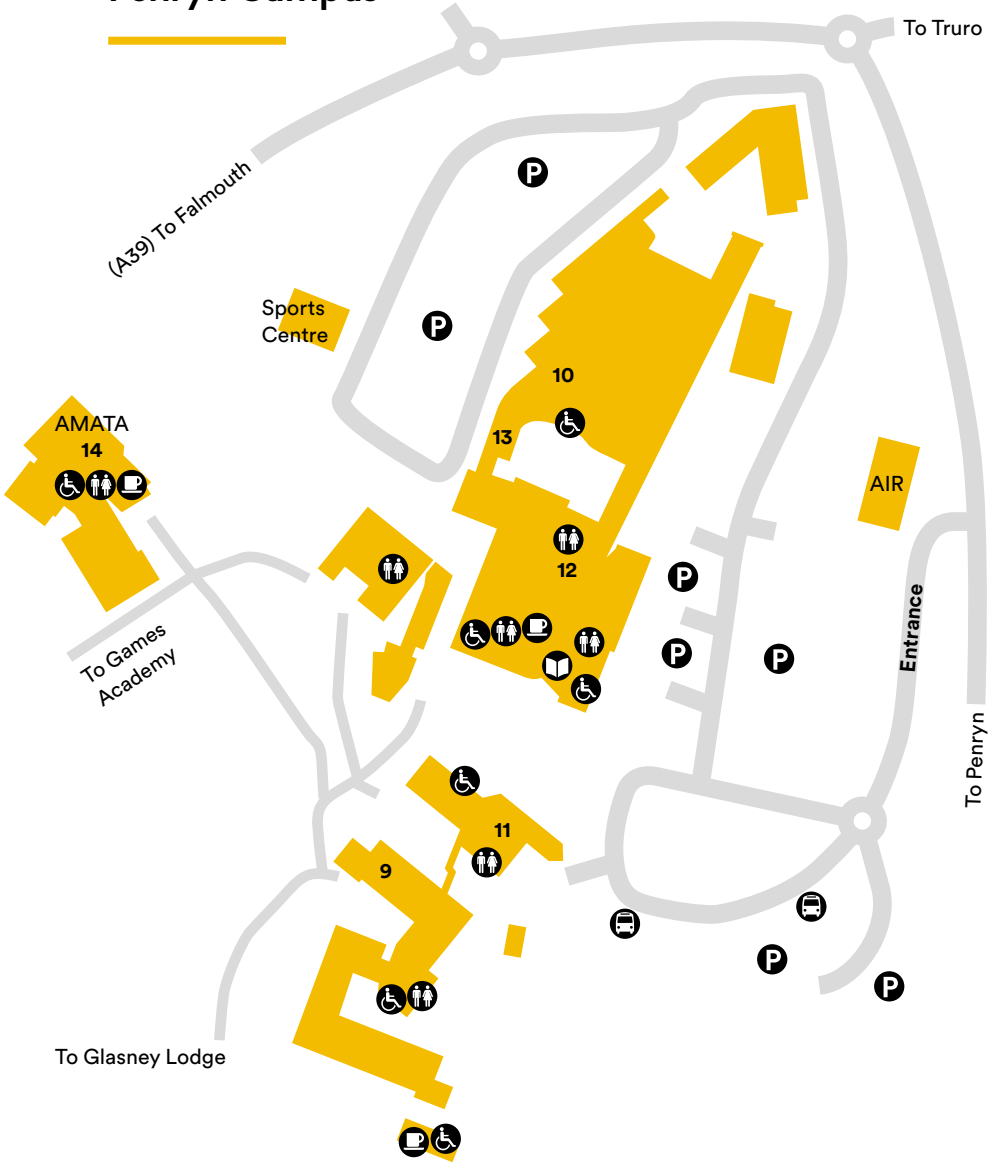

Attend police registration (if required) within 7 days of arriving in the UK, or within 7 days of obtaining your BRP.

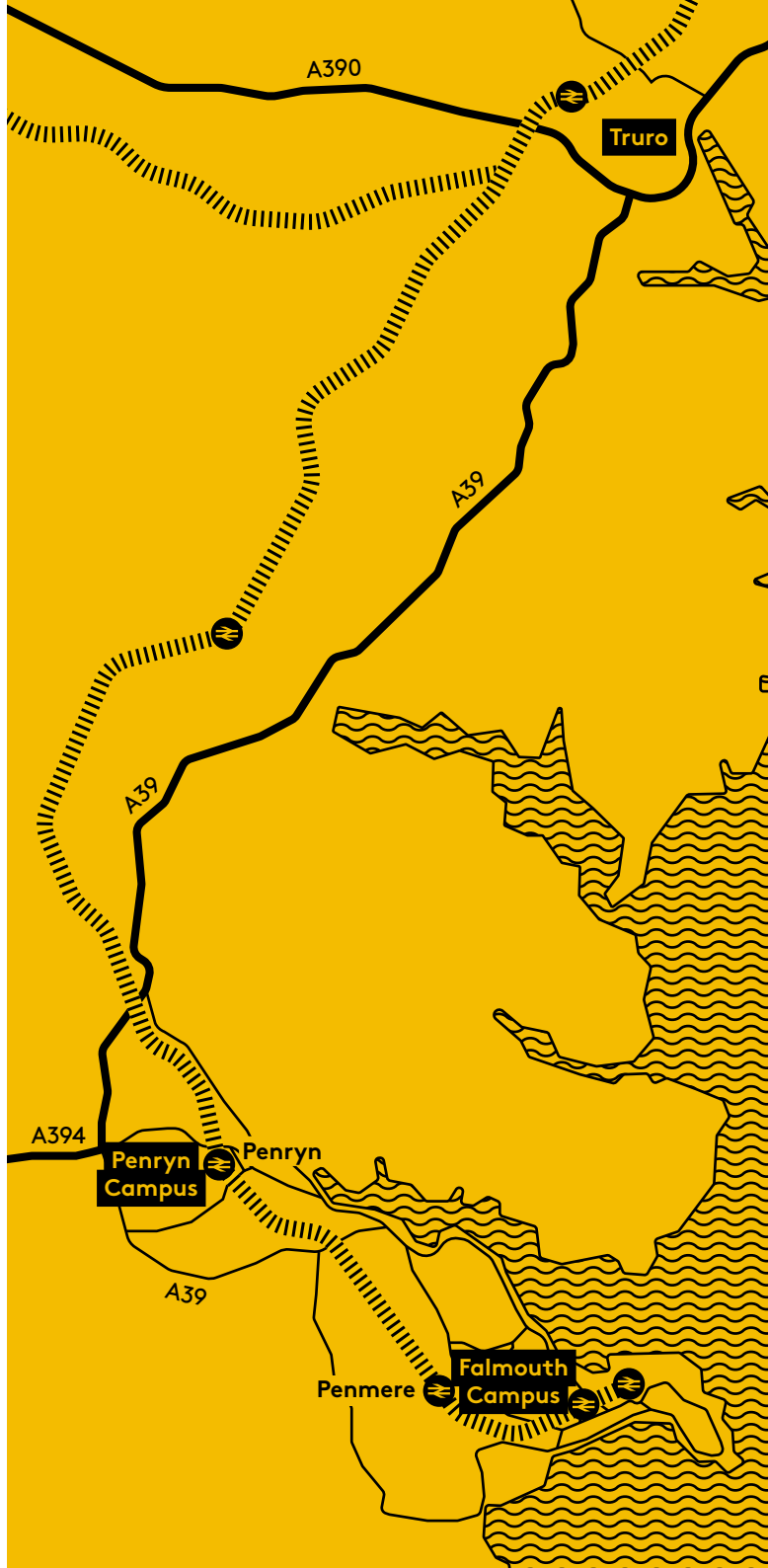

How do I get my Student ID Card?

If you have uploaded your photo, your Student ID Card should be on the front of this guide. If your card isn't on the front of this guide, please visit the Falmouth University Registration Desk in Sports Centre during the Welcome Weekend to collect it.

After the Welcome Weekend you can collect your card from the Late Registration Desk in The Compass, from Monday 18 to Friday 22 September between 10am and 4pm.

After these dates, you need to collect your card from one of the two Student Administration Offices (Penryn or Falmouth Campus). If your course is taught at the Penryn Campus you can collect your card from the First Floor, Tremough House, Penryn Campus. If your course is at the Falmouth Campus go to the Ground Floor, Tannachie House, Falmouth Campus. Both offices are open between the hours of 10am and 4pm.

Important Information:

It is the policy of the University to charge £10 for replacement Student ID Cards. To avoid this cost we suggest that you *do not*:

- Bend, scratch or tear the card
- Store the card alongside other cards with chips or magnetic strips or near your mobile phone
- Store the card in your pocket

You can purchase a new card at the Finance Office or via the Online Payment Portal on the University website.

If your card has been stolen, a new card may be printed free of charge if you can provide an active Crime Reference Number.
