Welcome to Television at Falmouth; we can't wait to meet you!

We're getting in touch with some important information about your course that will help you as you prepare to join us. We have a few small things for you to do in preparation for your arrival; read on and see the to-do list later in this letter.

You are now part of our vibrant, creative community here at the School of Film and Television (or 'SoFT' as we like to call it) within Falmouth University. You are joining over 800 like-minded students and staff studying in the school, and the wider community of creative arts students across Falmouth University.

The BA Television course team are experienced scholars and practitioners who are perfectly placed to guide and support you on your first steps towards academic success and industry employability. The path will be challenging, unexpected and often fun! You will be rewarded for your hard work, collaboration, and vision. We're really looking forward to working with you.

You will also find a list of equipment that you should bring with you, as well as any other costs that you might incur throughout your course.

Your academic experience will be predominantly in person with some courses using a small amount of digital resources to support your learning. To engage in the digital learning activity, although you will be able to access IT suites on campus, you will benefit from a laptop to access the platforms and tools we use. You will be provided with free access to the Microsoft Office suite, (including Word, Excel and PowerPoint) while you study at Falmouth.

If you are eligible for a loan from Student Finance and have not yet applied, please do so immediately to ensure the loan is approved before you enrol. Over the summer, you can join our Step into Falmouth Sessions. These online workshops are designed to provide advice and guidance on settling into university life.

We've got a small **'intro task'** for you to complete to help you get to know some of your new cohort:

- 1. Join our 'Student Mentor Group' on discord: <u>https://discord.gg/n7eua3Mw</u> and follow the instructions to accept the rules to gain full access.
- 2. In the 'roles' channel click the TV icon to add yourself to the 'TELEVISION' category.
- 3. Expand TELEVISION to see the 'introductions' channel this is where you'll post your response. You'll see the rest of these instructions there too.
- 4. Capture ONE screenshot from a television source of your choice (e.g. anything included, but not limited to, the 'watch' list below) that epitomises something that inspires you go beyond the everyday and find something you consider exceptional.
- 4. Post your chosen image to the 'introductions' channel along with a sentence about you and a sentence about your chosen image.
- 5. Comment on two other posts (looks for ones without other comments) to start the conversation with your new cohort and Student Mentors

Complete this task as soon as you like to get started on your new adventure or at least by 10am Monday 4th September 2023.

Your timetable

Your academic timetable shows all scheduled learning activities and your course timetable. It will be published in early September. After you've enrolled, you can view it via the Student Portal at <u>falmouth.myday.cloud/</u> or the Falmouth University App. You can download the app by searching the Google Play Store or Apple Store.

Welcome Week

Your timetable will show you where you need to go and when on Monday 18 September and throughout the week.

This is the week when you'll meet your course mates, course tutors and University staff. There will be important inductions to both your course and the wider University facilities and services, in addition to social activities organised by the University and Students' Union.

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Suggested watching/reading

It's important to maintain your work ethic and curiosity over the summer in order to be equipped to undertake the challenge of higher education study from September. Here are some ways you can do that.

Watch:

Watch plenty of television! Try different programmes, shows and content that you might not usually watch. Develop your opinion, you don't have to enjoy everything you watch to be learning a great deal. Think internationally! Have a look at television reviews and features in newspapers and online.

Within television we include:

- Drama (from one-offs to high-end series and soaps!)
- Documentaries
- Branded content and commercials
- Music videos
- Online content (vloggers, Youtube, corporate etc)
- Streaming and on-demand content (such as Netflix and Amazon)
- Sports TV
- Live and factual entertainment (including events like music festivals)
- And more...!

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Equipment and costs

Laptop (essential)

There is excellent access to computers at Falmouth, both PC and Mac, but you will also need your own laptop and a reliable internet connection to access the digital platforms we will be using for online activities as well as your independent and group-based work.

You can expect to pay £200-£300 to purchase a basic one for email and word processing. Video editing requires high powered computing which for most will be best achieved using our industry standard editing computers.

Technology (optional)

Smartphone

Even the most basic smartphone with a working camera will be sufficient for you to experiment with expressing yourself and developing your narrative storytelling to supplement the use of the bookable resources.

Hard Drive

Hard drives can be borrowed from our Stores however it's often handy to have access to your own to store and backup your work. Reliability is critical so we would recommend brands such as G-Tech or Lacie with USB 3 connectivity and ideally a minimum disk speed of 7200rpm (approx. £100).

Outdoor Clothing (optional)

You will be expected to work in all sorts of locations and weather conditions. It is therefore highly recommended that you come fully prepared with the right sort of personal clothing to protect yourself from the elements and to meet risk assessment requirements. This will set you up well for industry work beyond graduation too.

This list is not exclusive, so please use it as a guide; you should be able to equip yourself for the outdoors for approximately £150 (some companies offer student discounts so be sure to check):

- Waterproof jacket
- Warm headgear
- Strong waterproof boots/shoes
- Gloves
- Waterproof trousers (working all day in wet jeans is particularly unpleasant!)
- Warm/thermal top (and bottoms for good measure!)
- Mobile phone for emergencies

Driving Licence

To get work in the television and film industry it can be a real asset to have a driving licence (even if you don't have a car). If you don't have your licence yet and this is something you would consider then make a plan now on how and when you might achieve it. You don't need to be able to drive for university, although it can be useful and it may open up more professional opportunities to apply for.

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
