Welcome to BA (Hons) Film with Placement Year.

We're getting in touch with some important information about your course that will help you as you prepare to join us.

At the end of this letter, you will find a list of equipment that you should bring with you, as well as any other costs that you might incur throughout your course that are not covered by your student loan.

Your academic experience will be predominantly in person with some courses using some digital resources to support your learning. To engage in the digital learning activity, although you will be able to access IT suites on campus, you may find it beneficial to have a laptop to access the platforms and tools we use. You will be provided with free access to the Microsoft Office suite, (including Word, Excel and PowerPoint) while you study at Falmouth.

### **Student Finance**

If you are eligible for a loan from Student Finance and have not yet applied, please do so immediately to ensure the loan is approved before you enrol. Once you enrol you are liable for the tuition fees. Welcome Week starts on Monday 16 September for first year students.

Study Block one begins on 23 September and teaching and assessment will be throughout the full 15 weeks of the study blocks.

#### Your timetable

Your academic timetable shows all scheduled learning activities and your course timetable. It will be published from 9 September. ### **Welcome Week**

After you have enrolled, your timetable will show you where you need to go and when on Monday 16 September and throughout the week.

This is the week when you'll meet your course mates, course tutors and University staff. There will be important inductions to both your course and the wider University facilities and services, in addition to social activities organised by the University and Students' Union.



# **Pre-course preparation**

## Suggested watching/listening/reading

You should watch plenty of films over the summer. Challenge yourself by watching different genres outside your usual viewing, particularly world cinema. You'll be making short films at Falmouth, so seek out as many shorts as you can, try <a href="www.filmsshort.com">www.filmsshort.com</a> and <a href="www.com/channels/shortoftheweek">www.filmsshort.com</a> and <a href="www.vimeo.com/channels/shortoftheweek">www.vimeo.com/channels/shortoftheweek</a>, to get a sense of the format of the work you will be making at Falmouth. Seek out short and feature film scripts from screenwriters whose work excites you and where you can connect what's written, with the film itself. Again, many are online, start with <a href="www.simplyscripts.com">www.simplyscripts.com</a>.

Extend your reading to newspapers and current affairs publications to understand what stories are happening worldwide and consider how you can connect with that in your own work and writing. Take a listen to The Cinematologists podcast via <a href="www.cinematologists.com">www.cinematologists.com</a>, hosted by our own Professor Neil Fox. It's a regular in the Top Ten cinema podcasts, is one of Mark Kermode's favourite listens and features many of Falmouth's School of Film & Television staff and students discussing cinema with filmmakers and critics. Take a look too at MAI, a leading online journal run by our colleague, Associate Professor Anna Misiak at Falmouth, a leading online journal that features leading scholars and our own students discussing visual culture and representation <a href="www.maifeminism.com">www.maifeminism.com</a>.

Film and television trade publications such as ScreenDaily, Broadcast, Variety, Hollywood Reporter, and the BFI publication Sight & Sound will get you up to speed with who is making what (and where) and understand how cinema is discussed outside of the educational sphere. All have excellent free online resources, and your local authority library will likely have an online sign-up that allows you access to Press Reader – an app that will let you read these publications for free! Other great resources to familiarise yourself with include the superb BAFTA Rocliffe series online www.bafta.org/supporting-talent/rocliffe and guru.bafta.org/crafts/screenwriting.

# **Course equipment and costs**

A laptop will be an essential piece of equipment along with a reliable broadband connection (if you are living in University accommodation you will have this). You will also need access to a camera phone. You should make sure that you have sturdy waterproof shoes or boots, and waterproof clothing appropriate for wet weather – shooting on location in Cornwall can be a damp affair!

We are an AVID-accredited course, which means that you may if you choose to at some point (probably in third year, and particularly if you are interested in working in post-production) wish to sign up for our Pro Tools or Media Composer Certification courses. Tuition for these is free, but you will pay a fee to AVID for the exam, which also covers the ebooks they provide for your training. In 23-24 this fee was £76 per module.

### Highly Recommended - the 'Live @ AMATA Pass'

AMATA is Falmouth University's arts centre, offering a diverse year-round programme of exciting performances and productions, from monthly comedy nights to fantastic live music, trailblazing new theatre and dance.

The programme complements our portfolio of degrees and enables students to experience high quality, contemporary performances on their doorstep.

Students can purchase a one year Live @ AMATA Pass which offers five tickets for £25. This represents a 50% reduction on our standard student ticket price of £10.

Please note: If a parent or guardian is purchasing on behalf of a Falmouth University student, the account should be set up in the student's name, using their email address.

#### Study trips

Trips aren't mandatory but over the past few years, in most years we've been able to offer students the opportunity to travel to a major film festival (usually the Berlin Film Festival) as part of a group of students. Places are not funded and the cost as last estimated for travel in 23-24 was between £710 and £775 (this depends on the number of students travelling, and the rate of exchange at the time).

Students may find that they travel to one or more of the Royal Television Society Breaking Into Media events over the course of their degree, which are often held in Bristol or Plymouth – these are free but you may wish to consider the cost of bus or train transport to them, and potentially overnight accommodation.



# **Reading lists**

We highly recommend these texts as preparatory reading over the summer. They will help you to be best prepared for studying at university. For your academic preparation, if you get the chance read some of the books on our 'would be nice to have' reading list below, but we highly recommend the books by Lucy Tobin and Stella Cottrell to guide your future university study.

We also recommend a cookbook and for you to spend the summer extending your culinary skills before you arrive at university – a well-fed crew is a happy crew!

Each year, we recommend a cookery book. Life at university is far more than just study – you've moved home, are living independently, and meeting hundreds of new people as committed to the cinematic arts as you are – life skills are important. We really like Rachel's approach to cheap, healthy ingredients – she's a recent graduate too, so speaks from experience.
