Enrolment and Student Terms & Conditions

You'll get an email two weeks before the start of term telling you how to enrol online. You'll need to enrol before the first day of term to officially register as a student of Falmouth University and receive your undergraduate student loan.

Study Block one begins on 23 September and teaching and assessment will be throughout the full 15 weeks of the study blocks.

There is an induction week aimed at first years and new starters which begins on 16th September, you are welcome to come during that week to meet staff and settle in a bit. If you'd like to do that please email sally-ann@falmouth.ac.uk and we can arrange to meet.

Your timetable

Your academic timetable shows all scheduled learning activities and your course timetable. It will be published from 9 September. After you've enrolled, you can view it via the Student Portal at falmouth.myday.cloud/ or the Falmouth University App. You can download the app by searching the Google Play Store or Apple Store. It will also be accessible at mytimetable.falmouth.ac.uk.

Pre-course preparation

We have set some tasks for students to do over the summer to prepare for second year of the course. I will attach it at the bottom of this letter. But essentially, it is to keep practiced at drawing by producing a sketchbook or file of observational drawings. Plus, research into a textile process of your choice. (No physical work required, just an understanding of the historical and contemporary context of a textile process).

Course equipment and costs

You probably already have many items on this list, however, if you need to buy all these items from scratch, it will cost approximately £150. Current students recommend Hobbycraft for many items:

- Range of drawing pencils
- Gouache paints ensure these are good quality paints such with a high pigment content such as Windsor & Newton. (Current students recommend 'Arteza' and 'Seawhite').
 - White (large tube essential)
 - Lemon yellow (or any bright yellow)
 - Marigold yellow (or any orange)
 - Magenta
 - Spectrum red or primary red
 - Ultramarine blue or primary blue
 - Viridian green or a similar green
 - Burnt umber
 - Black
- A range of brushes
- White palette for mixing paints
- Masking tape and double-sided tape
- A2 folder (a transparent plastic portfolio folder can be bought in the University shop)
- A3 sketchbooks (can be bought in the University shop)
- A range of good quality paper for drawing
- Fabric scissors
- Small sharp-pointed scissors, kept for fabric and thread only
- Paper scissors
- (Optional) You may also consider a USB stick or hard drive for backing up your work

Note that once you have settled into a main discipline area (weave, print or mixed media) there will be essential equipment that you will need to purchase such as shuttles, threads, needles, pins.

Studio materials charge

We ask second year students to pay £100 in the first week to cover the cost of studio materials e.g. use of dyes, print pastes and chemicals, and other miscellaneous items. This covers your second and third year and is a one-off payment. You will also need to purchase fabrics and yarns and some specialist printing pastes as the course continues, but this cost varies from student to student depending on fabric/yarn choices and methods used. Some students spend £600 or more on additional materials in their final year, but it is possible to spend more or much less than this, depending on the processes used. We would expect year two costs to be less and recommend that second year students budget around £300 for extra materials.

Work placement

Short work placements and internships, generally undertaken during your second year, are very much encouraged, but are not required to pass the course. The costs of travel, accommodation and living should be factored in for this. Some placement providers may cover a limited amount of expenses, but this is not guaranteed.

New Designers Exhibition, London Optional

We aim to exhibit our best students at New Designers in the summer following your third year. The University covers some of this cost, but students also need to contribute towards the cost of the stand and van hire to transport to and from London. As a guide, the students this year are contributing £370 each. We encourage students to fund raise as a cohort to help reduce this cost.

Study trips

We run overseas study visits from time to time in the second and third years of the course. Recent visits have been to important international trade fairs such as Première Vision in Paris. Trips such as this are optional, and we work hard to secure the best deals for accommodation and travel.

Prices will vary at the time we organise the trips but as a guide, a trip we are planning to Amsterdam will cost approximately £500, including travel from London and accommodation, but not food.

BA (HONS) Textile Design summer assignment

Project title:	Investigate - draw, discover, explore
Start date:	May/ June 2024
Deadline:	September 2024
Project work required:	
A sketchbook or folder of drawing.	

Introduction:

In the first year of the course, you began to establish design and production skills. In the second year, design and production skills remain important on an on-going basis. We will also focus on other aspects of the professional arena of textile design, such as the *market* and *audience* that you design for.

Your individual drawing skills need to be utilised during this time. This summer assignment is designed to help you prepare for the first modules of second year.

The Brief:

Draw.

On this degree, drawing underpins everything. We would like you to return to the tradition of observational, analytical, and illustrative drawing. The idea is for you to keep your hand drawing skills active by keeping an ongoing sketch book.

This task is personal to you; choice of subject matter, scale, timings, colour, medium and texture are yours to make. We don't want to be too prescriptive here; it is time for you to make these kinds of decisions as they suit you as growing designers.

These skills will feed directly into all the second year modules.

A suggestion – challenge yourself with a drawing a day. You could do this in a 'BeReal' way, by drawing what you see at a set time every day.

Discover.

The first module in year two is a 4 week, fast paced investigative, development project called 'Process'. You'll be asked to select an area of textile practice and perfect it, push the boundaries of it, break rules and experiment with that process.

This summer, begin to research which process you might wish to work with. Find historical and contextual examples of the correct way to produce this technique.

You don't need to create any work for this, just prepare yourself for the project when it is launched in September.

A few process examples: gold work, cyanotype, wood cuts, tufting, woven pleats, satin, seersucker, embossing, felting, lace, passementerie, this list is never ending....
